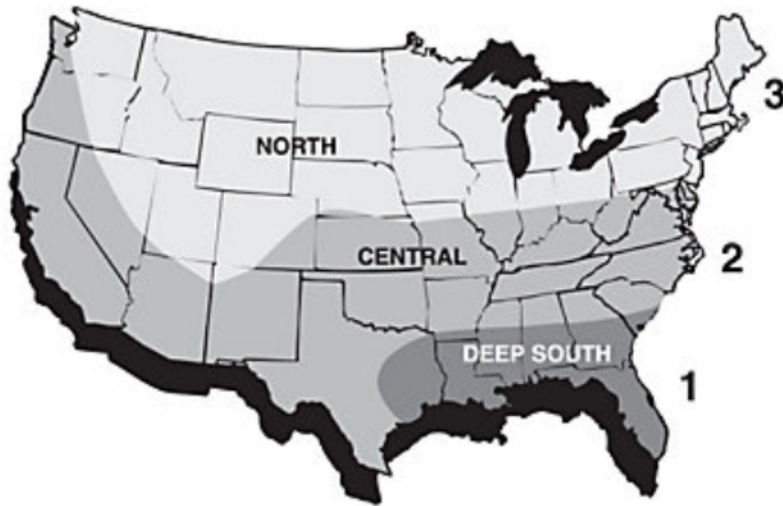


## Fall and Spring Cattle Deworming Guidelines



- A second treatment 12 weeks after parasite exposure begins may be necessary.

### Note:

- These are general deworming guidelines. Consult your local veterinarian if you have questions.
- Some regions have varying parasite burdens and may require additional treatments throughout the year.

Your cattle's health is important. The key to keeping them healthy is to deworm them regularly : the right time of year. Strategic deworming involves developing a program based on your climal parasite challenge. Keep your herd healthy with the following map and deworming guidelines.

The following map shows estimated period when parasite exposure first begins in the spring:

- March 1 (Deep South)
- March 1 - April 15 (Central)
- April 15 - May 15 (North)

### Fall Deworming Program

- Deworm all cows, calves and bulls as soon as possible following the first killing frost or freez killing frost is one severe enough to kill a tomato plant.
- If your region has not received a killing frost or freeze by Thanksgiving, then proceed with fa deworming as soon as possible.

### Spring Deworming Program

- Determine the estimated period when parasite exposure first begins in the spring. (See map
- Treat all cows, calves and bulls 6 weeks after parasite exposure begins.
